



In the area of **Health**, the Foundation is committed to promoting a sustainable healthcare system that focuses more on people and health literacy. With the Bosch Health Campus in Stuttgart, it has efficiently brought together care, research, education, and empowerment to benefit both patients and scientists.

In its **Education** funding, the Foundation works to promote a fair, high-performing education system that is focused on the well-being of children and young people.

In the **Global Issues** funding area, the Foundation works on major social challenges of our time. In particular, it aims to:

- promote sustainable and inclusive peace
- reduce systemic inequalities
- tackle the climate crisis by promoting climate-resilient land use
- shape a stronger sense of community in an immigration society
- strengthen democracy and
- ensure dignity in migration.

The Foundation strives to amplify the voices of those who are largely unheard in our public and political spheres.





How the Foundation works

The major social challenges of our time impact one another. Thus, the Foundation pays particular attention to the nexus between different societal issues. To this end, Robert Bosch Stiftung maintains its own facilities, develops innovative projects and provides support at both the

international and local level. It is active in Germany and Europe, in the Middle East, and in selected regions of Sub-Saharan Africa. The Foundation contributes findings from the projects it funds to the professional world and public debate. It supports interdisciplinary exchange between research, politics, and society and strengthens evidence-based political decision-making. With its fellowships, the <u>Robert Bosch Academy</u> enables leading figures from around the world to spend time working in Berlin, thus contributing to a network of international experts and opinion leaders.

Institutions

The Foundation owns and supports the Bosch Health Campus in Stuttgart. This includes the <u>Robert Bosch Hospital</u>, the <u>Dr. Margarete Fischer-Bosch Institute for Clinical</u> <u>Pharmacology</u>, the <u>Robert Bosch Tumor Center</u> and the <u>Robert Bosch Center for Innovative</u> <u>Health</u>. The Robert Bosch Stiftung is also a partner in the <u>Robert Bosch College UWC</u>, an international school in Freiburg in Breisgau, and the <u>International Alumni Center (iac)</u> in Berlin.

The Foundation and the company

The Foundation holds around 94 percent of the shares in Robert Bosch GmbH and is financed by its dividends. As a charitable foundation, it does not have any entrepreneurial activities. It has transferred the voting rights of the shares to Robert Bosch Industrietreuhand KG. Since its establishment in 1964, the Robert Bosch Stiftung has spent around 2.2 billion euros on its charitable work.


Stake in Robert Bosch GmbH and distribution of voting rights:
